

The Glorious Epiphany of the Lord

Epiphany is a Greek word (ἐπιφάνεια, epipháneia); it means manifestation or appearance. It is derived from the verb φαίνειν, phainein, meaning "to appear." There are writings about it dating to 200 A.D. However, the earliest reference to Epiphany as a Christian feast was in 361 A.D., by Ammianus Marcellinus. At the time, it was celebrated as a double feast of the baptism and birth of our Lord. It is also said by many early Church Fathers that Jesus was at the age of 30 when it took place, though not necessarily exactly that age. Today, the Maronite Rite and many Eastern Churches still celebrate the feast of the Epiphany of Jesus Christ on January 6, focusing on the Baptism of Jesus by St. John the Baptist.

All four apostles, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, reveal the Baptism of Jesus by St. John the Baptist as the first manifestation of the Holy Trinity to mankind. From the Angel's appearance to Mary until this event, everything was God acting in preparation for this moment. This moment—the epiphany at Jesus' baptism—indicates the starting point of the road each of us must also take for the sake of our salvation.

Saint Spotlight

Saint Ephrem the Syrian

Maronite Feast Day: January 28

Saint Ephrem (Ephraim) the Syrian, also called the "Harp of the Holy Spirit" and "Pillar of the Church," was said to be born in Nisibis at the beginning of the fourth century AD. He studied under the tutelage of bishop James of Nisibis, and he later (as tradition holds) became a deacon and lecturer at Nisibis (modernday Nusbyien, Turkey). After the fall of Nisibis after attacks by Persia, Ephrem departed from the city and began to live a solitary, ascetic life in a cell on Mount Edessa. Through nearly all his years, however, Ephrem was known to be a prolific writer, often explaining theological concepts and dismantling heresies through poems, sermons, and hymns, though he is best known for the latter.

After leading a life of contemplation, prayer, teaching, asceticism, service, and more, Deacon Ephrem of Syria passed from this life sometime in the 370s AD. Today, the Church venerates him as a Saint, and Pope Benedict XV named him a doctor of the Church on October 5, 1920. Some of his writings have been preserved to this day, including "Hymn to the Light," which Maronites pray daily as part of their Divine Office.

This month, we would like to highlight "Forgiveness: It's More Radical Than You Think," an episode of the Chris Stefanick show centered on one of life's most necessary subjects.

For Context: In the Maronite Church, the Feast of Epiphany commemorates the baptism of Jesus, the moment when God the Father identifies him as His beloved Son (Mark 1:11) and the Holy Trinity is manifested to mankind—an "epiphany" for the rest of the world. The way in which God chose to reveal His Son is telling: the Father prepared the way for Jesus's coming by sending John the Baptizer - a prophet who would "go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people by the forgiveness of their sins" partly by baptizing them with water. After that, He willed to reveal His Son's identity through this same holy but imperfect man's baptism, which he performed for the forgiveness of sins, even though Jesus himself was sinless. God chose the forgiveness of sins to be part of "preparing the way" for Christ, the signal for the presence of the Lord and so a window into the Father's heart, and an unconditional command for all members of His Body—one on which our salvation hinges (Matt. 6:14-15). He even forgave His own executioners while nailed to a cross (Luke 23:34). Yet, in the face of great pain, what does forgiveness mean?

In "Forgiveness: It's More Radical Than You Think," Chris Stefanick takes a deeper look at forgiveness. What is forgiveness, really, and what is it not? Why, given this information, would God choose forgiveness of sins to be the sign of salvation and a command for every Christian? Click here to view this thought-provoking resource.

May we always receive the grace to be full of God's forgiveness and to heal from all spiritual wounds, and may God truly forgive us in fullness as we accept His forgiveness for ourselves and others.





Healing Testimony of Randy Yoel Uraha



His mother miraculously survived, but he suffered multiple fractures, the most crucial of which was the fifth vertebra in his neck, which was shattered. He was rushed to Henry Ford Hospital and received care from Dr. Mohammed Mowafak Abdulhak. After X-rays and radiological examinations, the decision was made to perform surgery to replace the shattered vertebra with an artificial one...
