

# **Saint Spotlight**

**Saint Ignatius of Antioch** 



This Byzantine icon of St. Ignatius is a public-domain image of artwork in Hosios Loukas Monastery in Boeotia, Greece.

Feast Day: December 20

Saint Ignatius of Antioch was said to have been born sometime in the first century AD and martyred in Rome during the reign of Trajan (98 - 117 AD), supposedly on December 20th. As Bishop of Syrian Antioch, St. Ignatius was one of the Church's earliest theologians. A handful of his teachings are recorded in letters written to six early churches (Ephesians, Philadelphians, Magnesians, Romans, Smyrnaeans, and Trallians) and to Bishop Polycarp. St. Ignatius is known to this day for emphasizing the importance of "flawless unison" in the Church under the bishop and other ecclesial authorities (who share Christ's headship over the Church), stressing the necessity of the Eucharist and the Lord's Day, warning against being seduced by false teachings, and presenting martyrdom as a victorious union with Christ. His writings have made him both a controversial and intriguing figure in the Church's history, as his letters testify to a hierarchically-structured Church—at least to some degree—as early as the second century AD.





#### **Maronite Synaxarion: Season of Announcements**



An icon of the Blessed Mother's Visit to Elizabeth

Title: Reflections from the Maronite Synaxarion

Language: English

Abstract: As part of her tradition, the Maronite Church both prepares for and celebrates Christmas during the Season of the Glorious Birth of Our Lord, which spans from the six Sundays before Christmas (the Season of Announcements) until the Feast of Epiphany. Leading up to Christmas Day, Maronites traditionally center their contemplation around five chronological events (The Announcement to Zechariah, The Announcement to Mary, The Visitation to Elizabeth, The Birth of John the Baptizer, and the Revelation to Joseph) and one the genealogy of Jesus (Genealogy Sunday), all tied to the coming of the Messiah. The online reflections linked below are excerpts from the Maronite Synaxarion for Ramsho (evening prayer) for each of the six weeks before Christmas; each is meant to help us understand what we commemorate as we prepare to celebrate our Lord's birth. 

Healing Testimony of Elias Raymond Baaklini





Mr. Elias Raymond Baaklini is married to Mrs. Aida and has three children. Born in 1957 in Qornet Chahwane, he resides in Antelias, Lebanon. He tells about his health condition, as outlined in the medical report: "A tumor appeared in my throat on the left side, so I was admitted to the hospital where Dr. Sami Faddoul took care of me and conducted the necessary tests and X rays." It was revealed that I had cancer in my left tonsil. On November 5, 2022, I started the necessary treatments, especially radiation therapy administered by Dr. Eli Aazar.

During this time, my daughter visited the shrine of Saint Sharbel in Annaya, asking for his intercession before the Lord Jesus Christ to heal me. She brought a Saint Sharbel belt from his shrine and placed it around my neck. However, due to intensive radiation treatment and neck inflammation, I removed the ribbon, cut a part of it and tied it as a bracelet on my hand. The remaining part was placed by my wife under my mattress. After a few days, when my wife came to clean my bed, she found the remaining belt girdle oozing oil onto the bed's wood and sheets, interpreting this phenomenon as a good sign from Saint Sharbel.
